I am ending this Mother's Day message to you, to thank you for your loving supports to me during this difficult time: for your phone calls to check on me, for your emails and notes of care and encouragement, for your continuing supports to the parish by dropping off or mailing your weekly donations to the church's rectory. Especially, I would like to say a BIG THANK YOU to those who play the role of a parent to me by providing me meals and giving me supplies for my daily need.

For everything has been happening these days, it seems to be a frustrating and discouraging time, but I survive and I hope you all do, too. I have more time for private prayers, for exercise by walking or hiking, for working in the garden to upkeep the appearance of both churches. Thanks to the help of Daphne and Ken, we cleaned up the churches and St. Cecilia's parish hall. Last Friday, Ken and I came to mow the lawn at St. Mary's church. All look clean and beautiful.

To comply with the guidelines of the Archdiocese and of civil leaders, I celebrate private Mass only – no community Mass – at St. Cecilia Church, at 8 a.m. daily, including Sunday. I still fulfill the Mass intentions requested by the parishioners and others. I encourage you to keep attending livestreamed Mass, making a spiritual Communion, reading the Bible, praying the Rosary, etc. I also want to remind you that I keep St. Cecilia church's doors open most of the time for those who wish to visit the Blessed Sacrament and pray privately. Confession time is on Saturdays from 4 - 4:30 pm at St. Cecilia Church or by appointment (415) 488-9799. As always, I am available for sick call or anointing of the sick. During this difficult time, I volunteer to visit patients at Marin General Hospital one day a week. I will update more information when announced by the Archdiocese.

Thank you for your patience, understanding, and sacrifice in this critical time. Do not let your hearts be troubled. Have faith in God. Remain in Jesus' love, for the love of God will ultimately overcome this hostile world. The good will defeat the evil. Light will push away darkness. Let us put our hope in the Lord, and we will be blessed with the holy peace that God grants us through Jesus Christ our Risen Lord.
