FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT – YEAR B

Is 63:16-17, 19; 64:2-7... Ps 80... 1 Cor 1:3-9... Mk 13:33-37

The Lord of the House Is Coming.

Today, we celebrate the First Sunday of Advent – also the first day of a New Liturgical Year B – the year of Saint Mark’s Gospel. Advent brings us the awareness of our longing or waiting for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. It might be the anniversary of his first coming as we celebrate the Christmas – Christ’s Birthday. It might be his second coming at the end of time.

The end of the world is known only to God. It is Jesus’ second coming. It is his secret. We do know that the end of this world for each one of us is at the moment when we breathe our last breath. It is the moment when we have to leave this world behind, and enter a new future world that we know exists.

For some very good reason, Jesus does not tell us when this moment will be. But he only reminds us as we learn from the Gospel reading today: “Be watchful! Be alert! You do not know when the time will come!”

We are called to conversion, to prepare the room in our heart and soul worthily for the Lord to come. But we have a tendency of procrastination; we are not ready; we don’t prepare enough. We postpone everything until last minute: tomorrow and tomorrow. If many Christians knew the day and hour of their death, they would postpone their conversion until that last moment.

Saint Augustine said this: “It is by design that Jesus hid the last day from us – so that we’d be on the lookout for him every day of our lives.”

Through this holy season of Advent, we look for the coming of the Lord, so that – as

St. Paul says in the second reading – we are not lacking in any spiritual gift as we wait for the revelation of our Lord Jesus Christ.

We await his coming among us when we open the scriptures and celebrate the sacraments. We look forward to the celebration of his birth in Bethlehem. Perhaps most importantly, we long and yearn for his coming again in glory at the end of time. We do not know when the Lord of the house is coming: whether in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or in the morning. Let us ask the Lord to keep us always expectant of his coming that he might not find us unaware.

Let us be watchful, so that we are mindful of the Lord in our ways. And if the Lord suddenly comes at an unexpected time, he might meet us doing right.

May Advent be certainly for us a season in which we are reminded of our heart’s desire for Christ. May we prepare the home of our heart and soul for Christ, that when we abundantly receive Christ Jesus, we may generously share the gifts with our brothers and sisters in need!

Be watchful! Be alert!

Our prayer for this week: Lord our God, rend the heavens and come down (1). Come and save us (Ps) from our sins. Let us turn again to you (Ps) and so be found blameless (2) when you return in glory (3). Amen.
