FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT – YEAR C

Dt 26:4-10; Ps 91; Rom 10:8-13; Lk 4:1-13

We always begin the season of Lent with this gospel passage: the temptation of the Lord by the devil in the desert. This is a reminder for us that temptation is a part of our human life: worldly pleasure, vainglory, power, greed, money, materialism... We all are tempted. Even Jesus, the holy Son of God, was tempted. The difference is how Jesus and we respond to temptation: to resist temptation or to yield to it. Jesus refuses to give-in to temptation, but we often give-in to temptation.

Temptation is always a matter of thinking we don't need God. The grace to resist temptation is always available to us, but we don't always use it. That's why we sin. Our sin is because we don't put our trust in God. Often times, we don't follow God's commands.

Lent is a time for us to reflect and pray. We all need to go into the desert from time to time. The desert here is not only a solitude place like the wilderness, but also the innermost and quiet space in our heart and soul.

Lent is a kind of little desert as we are encouraged to back away from a few of life's pleasures – pleasures that pull us away from God or distract us from reflecting on the more serious side of our spiritual life.

Lent is time to help us to think and pray about our relationship with the Lord. Let us follow Jesus' examples, to enter the desert of our life – deep down in our heart and our mind, so we can fast sincerely, and pray earnestly, and do our work of charity more generously.

Jesus told us he will never reject anyone who comes to him. But we do have the freedom to follow his way, or to turn away from him by not following his way.

Life may be beautiful for us today, but it could be over for any of us tomorrow. The important thing to know is that eternal life is ahead for us, too, if we remain faithfully to our Lord and follow him.

In conclusion, to help us make our choice by resisting temptation or yielding to it, I would like to quote a beautiful saying of Msgr. Kennedy, a late pastor at St. Raphael's parish. He always said this at the beginning of the Mass: "Life is short. Death is certain. Heaven and hell are forever. Make your choice, my friends. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen."

Lenten Regulations: here is a summary of current practice of fasting and abstinence in the Catholic Church. On Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all Fridays of Lent: everyone of age 14 and up must abstain from consuming meat. On Ash Wednesday and Good Friday: everyone of age 18 to 59 must fast, unless exempt due to usually a medical reason.
